DIWALI NIGHT IS TONIGHT!

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"Diwali or "deepavali", as it is known, means "a row of lamps". It is usually celebrated at the end of October or beginning of November. The festival is a mark of victory for when lord Rama returned to his kingdom Ayodhya with his wife Sita after having vanguished the demon Ravan and having spent 14 years in exile. To guide him home, the people of his kingdom lit his path with oil lamps. With this began the tradition of decorating houses with lamps and lanterns, a symbolism for light prevailing over darkness and rid yourself off all the negativity.



The festival of lights is a much-loved festival all over India. It is a time of merriment where people share home-made sweets and delicacies and wish each other prosperity and good health. It is a five-day long ordeal to celebrate the win of good over evil. Each day signifies a different tradition. Children and adults indulge in colourful fireworks that are the highlight of the festival. People enjoy dressing up in traditional attires and visit each other's homes wishing everyone well.

More than its historical significance, modern day India celebrates the festival to get together with their loved ones over the course of five days and rejoice in their health and prosperity. The Indian Student Council is striving to bring the same authenticity and the sentiment of the festival at our event Diwali Night, this year. We not only want it to be an enjoyable time for Indian students on campus but also be a platform for culture exchange and dialogue between students from various cultural backgrounds. We will have several cultural performances, authentic Indian food, and a recount of how this festival came to be. We hope that the warmth and the light lightens up your hearts and lives.

The Indian Student Council will host Diwali Night on Friday, November 1st at 6:00 PM in the Beckerman Recreation Center. Entry is free for University of New Haven students, faculty, staff, and alumni (ID is required). Admission for quests is \$7 collected in cash at the door.



The first Sunday in November of 2019 is when Daylight Saving Time ends in most areas of the U.S., so we'll "fall back" and return to Standard time. **We'll set our clocks back one hour before bed on the night of Saturday, November 2nd**.

The return of Standard Time means the Sun will rise a little earlier (at least according to our clocks) so if you're an early riser, you'll enjoy the rays as you have your breakfast. And you'll "gain" one hour of sleep. The bad news? It will be dark earlier.

Many digital devices like computers and smart phones automatically make the time change, but you want to double check you have the right time, especially if you have plans on Sunday, November 3rd.



MYATT CENTER FOR DIVERSITY & INCLUSION


Registration for Spring semester courses is opening soon! Please see the schedule below:



If the ISO is missing any of your documents or you have not completed the Orientation requirement, you must finish all requirements in order to have your hold removed.






HOW EDUCATION IMPACTS BLACK MEN

You are invited to hear a panel of "The Class & Colour of Tone". This discussion is comprised of educational experts, administrators, and policy makers along with a select group of young black males to share their educational experiences. Experts, administrators, and policymakers will give short introductions along with their opinion on the importance of education and how they have seen it impact the lives of young black males throughout their career. Then several young black males will speak for themselves and share their experiences and how education has impacted their lives.

This panel will be taking place on November 5th, 2019 @ 5:00 pm at the University of New Haven Bucknall Theater. Throughout time, conversations with and about young black males have focused on the wrongs that they do and the odds that are against them. Often, young black males' voices are set against the backdrop of haughty social invectives and shortsighted analyses of their problems. The dialogues we have with them typically assume their current environment and behavior which are debased beyond anything witnessed in modern history, which we justify through relentlessly repeating ill-conceived and poorly sourced statistics.
